About John Ben Snow



John Ben Snow was born and raised in Pulaski. New York. a small village north of Syracuse. He graduated from New York University in 1904 and soon thereafter entered F.W. Woolworth & Company. A man of vision, he was attracted to mass market sales and introduced innovative retailing techniques. He rose rapidly through the ranks from stock boy to corporate director, initially in New York, and finally in Great Britain, where he accumulated a small fortune through hard work, savings and wise investments. After retiring from Woolworth in 1939, Mr. Snow devoted the remainder of his life to building the Speidel chain of newspapers and publishing the Western Horseman. He was fond of animals, especially horses, enjoyed racing, fox hunting, polo and range riding. Throughout his life, John Ben Snow shared his wealth with relatives, friends, business associates and fellow Pulaskians. He gave generously and freely to those persons and causes he cherished. He preferred to "invest" in people, especially the young, by making available financial assistance. He also believed in improving the quality of life in a variety of communities. To further these and other philanthropic causes, he provided in his will for a charitable trust.

In 1975, two years after his death, The John Ben Snow Memorial Trust was established in New York. The four original trustees were a member of the Snow family, a lawyer, a publishing associate and a corporate trustee, the Irving Trust Company, now BNY Mellon N.A.. All were close to the donor and aware of his beliefs, values and ideals. The individuals named as trustees and their successors were empowered to grant funds for educational, scientific and humanitarian purposes to qualified organizations.

FUNDING POLICIES

The Memorial Trust strategically focuses funding within core geographic regions of the United States and through prioritized investment in the following grant programs (prioritized below).

Primary Grant Program: Dating back to the inception of the Memorial Trust in 1973, the primary and overarching grant making priority has been and continues to be programs that focus on education.

- Education: Primary and secondary education, literacy, and vocational training are essential ingredients to improving life outcomes.
 - Program Goal: To reduce barriers that limit equitable opportunities and expand equal access to quality education
 - Program Strategy: Supporting early childhood education, academic tutoring, literacy, college access, internships, scholarships, fellowships, and journalism focused on underrepresented populations and first generation students

Secondary Grant Programs: The Memorial Trust considers proposals within the areas of Arts and Culture, Community Initiatives, and Youth Programs. The objective is to extend the primary educational focus by providing funding support within these additional program areas.

- Arts and Culture: Engagement in the arts creates a stronger and more vibrant community and culture.
 - o **Program Goal:** To foster arts education and appreciation.
 - Program Strategy: Through educational curriculum, instruction, and engagement of young adults via visiting artists or performances.
- **Community Initiatives:** A resilient social infrastructure is essential to a healthy local community.
 - Program Goal: To directly enhance the lives of the residents within our core geographic regions by expanding services that bridge the poverty gap.
 - Program Strategy: Investing in community centers, safe and affordable housing, human services delivered by shelters and food pantries, and veterans services.

- Youth Programs: Encouraging young adults to dream and equipping them to succeed can change the trajectory of their lives.
 - Program Goal: To empower young adults in their personal development and to equip them in their professional aspirations.
 - o Program Strategy: Developing sustained relationships that offer one-on-one mentoring, character education, skills training, and violence prevention.

Tertiary Grant Programs: The Memorial Trust does consider proposals in the areas of Disabilities and Universal Access, Environment, and Historic Preservation. As these are not core focus areas, funding is often limited. Priority will be given to proposals with an educational focus.

- **Disabilities and Universal Access:** A person with a physical, mental, or emotional disability should have equal access to opportunity within the community.
 - Program Goal: To support services for individuals with a disability as well as provide universal access to facilities for these individuals.
 - o **Program Strategy:** Supporting programs for people with disabilities as well as required facility renovations to enable universal access.
- **Environment:** Stewardship of the local environment is a fundamental responsibility.
 - o **Program Goal:** To support environmental education and conservation initiatives.
 - Program Strategy: Through educational instruction and materials (e.g., curriculum, brochures, signs) coupled with protection of strategic parcels of land and water.
- **Historic Preservation:** Preservation of our history is important in order to educate the broader population on past events to inform current events.
 - **Program Goal:** To preserve historical accounts and artifacts to benefit future generations.
 - o **Program Strategy:** Through educational instruction and materials (e.g., curriculum, brochures, signs) coupled with protection of sites, structures, objects, and events.

Geographic Focus: The majority of the Memorial Trust's grant funding is focused within three core geographic regions (i.e., Central New York, Northern Nevada, and New Jersey). While there is not a geographic restriction, the Trustees prefer to be directly engaged and have oversight of the grants that are made.

It is the Memorial Trust's general policy to give preference to proposals seeking funds for new or enhanced programs, one-time, short-term grants to sustain a program until funding is stabilized, matching grants used to encourage the participation of other donors, and "last dollars" towards a capital campaign.

The Memorial Trust will not accept proposals from individuals or for-profit organizations. Additionally, the Memorial Trust does not encourage proposals from religious organizations or proposals for endowments, contingency funding, or debt reduction. There are no minimums or maximum grant amounts; however, most grants range from \$10,000 to \$25,000. First-time grants to organizations typically range from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

GRANT APPLICATION PROCEDURES

The Memorial Trust is pro-active in seeking grant proposals from qualifying 501(c)(3) organizations. Additionally, the Memorial Trust accepts unsolicited proposals from qualifying organizations.

An initial letter of inquiry must be submitted via the Trust's online grant management system between **December 1st** and **February 1st** of the year in which a grant is requested. If the proposal meets the stated guidelines and priorities of the Memorial Trust, grant application instructions will be sent to the applicant. If invited after the receipt of the letter of inquiry, all grant applications must be submitted via the Trust's online grant management system by **April 1st** of the year in which a grant is requested.

The Trustees may require additional information and possibly an interview or site visit. Any discussions or indications of interest should not be construed as a commitment by the Trustees. All complete grant applications are carefully considered and evaluated by the Trustees. Applicants are notified of the Trustees' decision by **July 1st**. All approved grant applicants are required to sign a Grant Acceptance Agreement prior to any funds being granted.

REPORTING RESPONSIBILITIES

Because the Trustees assume that the grantee has a moral and legal obligation to account for all funds received, each grantee is required to submit a grant report via the Trust's online grant management system by **June 1st** of the year after the approval of the grant. All grant reports are reviewed by the Trustees. Any change in plans must be approved by the Trustees. If a grantee fails to submit a formal report, the Trustees reserve the right to request that the grant funds be returned. Additionally, further grants will not be considered until a final report is received.
